The Gospel of Your Salvation

"In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation..." (Ephesians 1:13)

The gospel of Christ, or the good news of Christ, is a must if sinners are saved. Though the Lord could have used something else to bring sinners to Jesus, it pleased Him to use the preaching of the gospel. *"For after that in the wisdom of God the world by wisdom knew not God, it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe."* (1 Corinthians 1:21)

Consider some reasons why sinners must hear the gospel if they get saved.

1. Sinners Must Hear About Jesus To Believe In Him

After stating that anyone who will call upon the Lord for salvation can be saved, Paul then wrote, *"How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher?"* (Romans 10:14) Sinners must therefore hear the gospel story in order for them to know the way of salvation and believe in Jesus to save.

2. Sinners Must Hear The Gospel Before They Will Feel A Need of Jesus

Paul said that he was not ashamed of the gospel of Christ because he knew what it could do for sinners. *"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."* (Romans 1:16) Sinners only come to Jesus after they feel a

need to come to Jesus. The gospel has the power to make them feel that need.

After a very large congregation listened to Peter preach the gospel of Christ they were *"pricked in their heart"* and cried out, *"Men and brethren, what shall we do?"* (Acts 2:37) About three thousand of them were saved. As Paul shared the gospel with Felix and his wife Drusilla, Felix trembled. (Acts 24:25)

Sinners only come to Jesus for salvation after they see themselves as helpless sinners. They must see themselves as they are and Jesus as He is. The Gospel has the power to bring this to pass.

3. Sinners Must Hear the Gospel To Have Faith To Come To Jesus

Sinners must have some help if they fully trust their sinful self and whole eternity into the hands of One they have never seen. The gospel has the power to bring a sinner to the place where he can fully trust in Jesus for eternal life. It happens when the sinner opens his ears and heart to the gospel of Christ. *"So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God."* (Romans 10:17)

A person remains lost in his sins if the gospel of Christ is foolishness to him. On the other hand, a person can know that he is saved by God's grace if he rejoices in the power of the gospel to save. *"For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God."* (1 Corinthians 1:18)

Without the gospel of Jesus Christ, sinners remain lost in

From the Dunlaps...

Greetings from Abundant Life in Christ Missionary Baptist Mission, and from our mother church, Bethel in Sikeston.

We really couldn't have asked God to close out our year better than He did. We set a new morning worship attendance record in December of 37 ... which beat the record of 36 we had set in November ... which had beat the record of 32 we had set in October. Deb's working has cut drastically into my visitation hours, but if my records are correct, all but five of our visitors from the last four months have continued to come to services at least sporadically, and so attendance continues to climb. Praise God! When the days get longer I hope to be able to do more visitation. Most of our people are with us either directly or indirectly as a result of door to door, and so I really put a lot of emphasis on that. I still have probably a little over 1/4 of town

that I have not covered.

We also set a new monthly morning worship attendance average of 29. Our Wednesday night average was 18.

The best news of the month is the salvation of Rachel. Again, praise God! Rachel came to our first night of VBS in July and has never stopped coming. I could see the Holy Spirit bringing her along and it was a tremendous joy to see her repent through tears. Her mom brings her and her four brothers and sisters to the mission because, as she told me, I "actually get up there and preach the Bible." It's not that I'm a stellar speaker; it's just that in our area there is a shortage of churches that take an overtly fundamental view of scripture.

January 2 is the two year mark for my family on this field. As we look back, we can only be thrilled at what God has done. We moved to Charleston knowing two people. Both of those are now members of the mission. Additionally, a mother

and daughter who were driving 20 miles from Bertrand (which is five miles from Charleston) to be members at Matthews while we were there, in time moved their membership here. Beyond those four, we have simply made it our business to meet people and to love people, and God has blessed that effort mightily as He has gathered people to Himself to make up this mission.

I told Deb going into this that if we were here six months and nothing was happening, we would try another field, but that if we were here six months we would almost certainly be here two years, and that if we were here two years, we would almost certainly be here long term. As we pass that two year mark, I see no reason why Abundant Life in Christ Missionary Baptist Mission will not one day be Abundant Life in Christ Missionary Baptist Church. We thank you so much for helping to make this work a reality.

Abortion- the Legacy of Roe vs Wade.

The American Civil Liberties Union (A.C.L.U.) hailed the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 decision in Roe vs Wade as "an important step in the right direction." Everyone has an opinion about abortion. It is God's opinion that will be the final authority concerning this subject. In the writings of Job, chapter 31, verses 14 and 15 it states, "what then shall I do when God riseth up? And when he visiteth, what shall I answer him? Did not he that made me in the womb make him? And did not one fashion us in the womb?"

The following contrasting of one hundred (100) years is visible in the change of the American Medical Association's (AMA) Policy Statements on Abortion. This was the general opinion of the AMA just before Roe vs Wade of 1973:

The American Medical Association on Abortion: An anatomy of Contrasting Policy Statements: When Does Human Life Begin?

1871 - "No other doctrine appears to be consonant with reason or physiology but that which admits the embryo to possess vitality from the very moment of conception"

The AMA abortion policy statements of 1967 and 1970 include no references to the scientific fact that human life begins at conception.

What is Abortion?

1859 - "The slaughter of countless children; such unwarrantable destruction of human life"

1871 - "The work of destruction; the wholesale destruction of unborn infants"

1967 - "The interruption of pregnancy; the induced termination of pregnancy."

1970 - "A medical procedure"

What Should the Ethics of Abortion Be?

1871- "Thou shalt not kill. This commandment is given to all without exception...it matters not at what stage of development his victim may have arrived."

1967 - "This is a personal and moral consideration which in all cases must be faced according to the dictates of the conscience of the patient and her physician."

Who Should Perform Abortions?

1871 - "It will be unlawful and unprofessional for any physician to induce abortion."

1970 - "Abortion should be performed only by a duly licensed physician."

Who Are Physician Abortionists?

1871 - "men who cling to a noble profession only to dishonor it; false brethren; educated assassins; modern Herods; the executioners."

1967 - "Conscientious practitioners; conscientious physicians"

What Should Be done to Physician Abortionists?

1871 - "These men should be marked as Cain was marked; they should be made the outcasts of society."

1970 - "They should be permitted to perform as long as they take place "in an accredited hospital."

CBC Launches Phase I of the Journey of Faith Campaign

January marks the beginning of the public period the \$1.5 million Journey of Faith Campaign for Central Baptist College. According to CBC President Terry Kimbrow, "We have been in the 'quiet period' raising support for the campaign for the past six months. This is one of our smaller campaigns but it is only Phase I of what will eventually lead to a much larger campaign and greater things for the future of CBC."

The one-year, \$1.5 million campaign carries with it five priorities. "I am elated to report," said Kimbrow, "that as we launch this campaign, we have already received over \$1,000,000 toward the campaign putting us two-thirds of the way toward our goal." The five main priorities of the campaign are as follows:

1. Capital Improvements \$ 400,000

- Science Center \$200,000

One of the most exciting developments on campus is the renovation of the old cafeteria/kitchen area in the Harold E. Cooper Educational Complex to make way for a new Science Center. When completed, the new Science Center will house two Biology Labs, two Chemistry Labs, a Research Lab, a large classroom, chemical storage and faculty offices. The construction and equipping of the new Science Center is made possible, in part, by a \$1.9 million Title III Strengthening Institutions Grant. The grant, paid over five years, is also providing funds for the establishment of three new Bachelor of Science degrees: Biology, Biotechnology, and Health Sciences and two new faculty members to support the degree programs. However, certain priorities of the Science Center are not provided for in the grant funding and must be raised through private support.

- Renovation of vacated area in the A. R. Reddin Fieldhouse \$100,000

Upon relocation of the current Science labs, the vacated space in the A. R. Reddin Fieldhouse will be renovated for student, employee, and alumni use. Current plans include an enhanced fitness center complete with weight room and upgraded fitness equipment.

- Renovation of Rental Unit for Upperclassman Housing \$100,000

With a growing enrollment, on-campus housing is nearing capacity. The women's residence hall, Bruce Hall, has been at or near capacity for the past several years. The college owns a large two-story house adjacent to the campus that was recently rezoned by the city of Conway. The Board of Trustees approved the renovation of this residence for student housing. Upon completion, it will house up to twenty upper class women and along with a resident director.

2. Teacher Education Program \$500,000

This four-year process will begin in the fall of 2009 and include four major steps: 1) Accreditation by NCATE (National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education); 2) Additional faculty (both full-time and part-time); 3) Development and maintenance of assessment systems; and 4) Additional library resources including print, curricular, and electronic. The benefits of adding a teacher education program are at least four-fold: 1) Increased enrollment for the institution; 2) The opportunity to prepare future teachers in a Christ-focused environment; 3) Increased the profile and prestige for CBC; and 4) Increased revenue for the institution.

3. Deferred Maintenance \$300,000

CBC has been blessed with a beautiful campus. However, some major maintenance needs have been postponed in recent

years because of budget constraints. The time has come to deal with these needs. Our buildings are our greatest physical asset and must be properly maintained.

4. Debt Retirement \$100,000

A variety of short-term debts will be eliminated to enhance cash flow.

5. General Fund Support \$200,000

General fund support is always a priority and has to not only be maintained during this campaign, it must see growth. Over the past several years, the general fund has suffered a decline as it relates to the overall budget growth.

A concerned parent should look at all the pictures sent on their kid's phone. You pay for the phone, and they are living under your roof, right? You say you must trust your teens. Yes. But you are also to be their surrogate brain to help them make right decisions. Even good kids will make poor choices living in the society that we do. Society encourages this. Your child may not know how wrong this is. That is your job to look at their text messages and pictures and if there is anything inappropriate; you correct them. They may not think it is wrong or see the consequences. That is your job. You should look at Face book. Most kids today communicate with friends on the internet using a thing called "Face book." Do you know what pictures have been sent to your child's page? Do you know what things are being said by your child and to your child? You should. There are horrible pictures on Face book that Christian young people have on their page. The teen says, "Well, they sent that to me. I didn't do it." Yes, but it reflects on who you are as a person. Your face book site represents your testimony to the world. Does it reflect Christ?

How do so many Christian boys get hooked on internet

pornography? Should you not monitor the entire history of everything pulled up on your home computer? Should you not limit access to the internet by your kids and supervise the computer when they are on it? Who are they talking to, and what kind of language are they using when they are on the computer to friends? Do you have Christian filters on the computer? Do you have filters that clean up the language on your TV? The list is endless. What are you parents doing to monitor your kid's behavior? That is your job. It is called parenting.

Some may say I don't want to snoop on my kids. You are not snooping. You are being a parent. The devil is too clever with his devices of today for you to act ignorant about what your kids are doing. The society has too many modern technologies for your kids to do impure things. They may not even realize how they are hurting their walk with the Lord by doing these things. Many young boys may not realize how they hurt their future marriage by looking at things on the internet. Girls may not realize how they hurt their testimony and even how they affect who they will attract as a boyfriend by the way they talk on the internet. Some young girls obviously do not realize how it hurts them to send naked pictures of themselves on the phone to a boyfriend, because recent studies suggest that about 75% do so!

I see kids sit out in church and during the sermon they text their friends on the cell phone or play games on their cell phone. Parents claim ignorance about this, and act like they don't know it is happening. Shame on you. You know. If I acted up in church as a teen, I guarantee my parents would have disciplined me royally. And if a parent truly is ignorant about all of this, then it is high time to get involved in what is going on in your kid's life. I believe it has to do with the parent's self-esteem. There are many Christian parents who refuse to acknowledge that their children are in fact not doing the right thing. Instead of correcting this and helping their child learn and grow in the right way, they turn a blind eye towards the problem. They deny the problem. They become defensive when confronted with the problem. They bury their head in the sand so to speak. This is because they have low self-esteem and self worth. Their worth as a person is too wrapped up into how well their children are perceived. If there is any problem with their child's behavior, they see it as a direct reflection on them as to their failure as a parent. They can't handle this failure, so they allow the child to go on with his bad behavior. This results in a child who is not living for the Lord, and is in fact, harming their spiritual well-being. This is truly sad. Both for the parents and the sake of the child.

Look what the Lord told Eli about his kids that he refused to do something about.

I Samuel 13:3 *"For I have told him that I will judge his house forever for the iniquity which he knoweth: because his sons made themselves vile, and he restrained them not."*

Eli reprimanded his sons too gently, and did not threaten them as he should, and therefore God judged his whole family. All of his family will be cut down in the prime of life and not one, live to an old age. All of those in the family not cut down early, will live with no joy and be broken and poor and miserable

One of Mrs. Henry's nieces recently made the presentation of the check to CBC President Terry Kimbrow. Kimbrow commented, "I am humbled that Mrs. Henry would remember the college in such a generous way. However, it does not surprise me. She was a very kind and considerate person."

Mrs. Henry died March 12, 2008 in a car accident in Maumelle at the age of 84, the widow of J. A. Henry. She was born February 10, 1924 in Guy. Mrs. Henry retired from Safeway Stores, Inc. in 1986 after working for 25 years in the corporate office in Little Rock. She was a member of Temple Baptist Church in Little Rock for 47 years.

Mrs. Henry has a keen interest in current events and politics. She enjoyed traveling, having visited all 50 states and many countries in Europe and the Far East. She also followed Arkansas sports closely and often attended Razorback games, Travelers baseball games and Twisters arena football games until the time of her death.

Having no children of her own, her strong love of family was shown to her two sisters, Majorie Trimble of Little Rock and Montean Joyner of Conway, and the families of her husband. Her sisters survive her as do many nieces and nephews.

According to President Kimbrow, the details of scholarship program are pending and will be published upon approval by the college scholarship committee.

International Scholarship Fund Established

The international student population at Central Baptist College is on the rise. They had students in the fall 2008 semester from Brazil, Cape Verde, China, Kenya, Korea, Niger, Romania, Russia, Sierra Leone, and Tanzania.

According to CBC President Terry Kimbrow, "One of the greatest challenges for international students is that after they come to the United States, their funding often dries up. In some cases, the tuition money promised for future semesters just does not materialize." It is important to note that international students are not eligible for federal financial aid, including Pell Grants, loans and federal work study. Federal regulations also prohibit most international students from holding an off-campus job and on-campus jobs are scarce.

The Office of the President is working to establish a scholarship fund for international students at CBC. "The primary purpose of this fund," related President Kimbrow, "will be to aid students who have a proven academic track record but have exhausted all financial resources. In other words, they have been at CBC at least one semester, are doing well socially and academically, but if they do not get outside funding, they will have to leave the institution and possibly return home." Scholarships disbursed from this fund will be awarded by the CBC scholarship committee based on financial need and academic standing.
